



## Ginkgo biloba 'Pendula'



<b>Height</b>	2 - 2,5 m
<b>Crown</b>	broad weeping, light, open crown, capricious growing
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Autumn colour</b>	yellow
<b>Flowers</b>	green, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	fruitless cultivar
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, all soil types
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	fairly to good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Application</b>	parks, tree containers, cemeteries, roof gardens, industrial areas, large gardens, small gardens, patio gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem conifer, specimen conifer

At first, this cultivar has branches that spread almost horizontally. Later, they hang down. This produces a broad weeping shape. Height depends on the grafting site – usually between 2 and 2.5 m. 'Pendula' is often confused with the cultivar 'Horizontalis', the branches of which grow in a more horizontal pattern, especially at a mature age. The tree grows slowly, rendering it suitable for small gardens, as well. The fan-shaped leaves grow in bundles of 3 - 5 together and have an incised top. 'Pendula' does not turn such striking a striking colour in the autumn. It requires a site with ample light and tolerates heat well. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
