Ginkgo biloba 'Tubifolia'



Height	2 - 4 m
Crown	broad fan-shaped, light, open crown, capricious growing
Bark and branches	twigs light brown, bark grey-brown, later deeply grooved
Leaf	fan-shaped and curled into tubes, in clusters of 3 - 5, up to 5 cm long and wide, green
Autumn colour	yellow
Flowers	green, inconspicuous, April/May
Fruits	fruitless cultivar
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	any
Paving	tolerates paving
Winter hardiness zone	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
Wind resistance	fairly to good
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
Application	parks, tree containers, cemeteries, roof gardens, industrial areas, large gardens, small gardens, patio gardens
Shape	clearstem tree, feathered tree, clearstem conifer, specimen conifer

Slow-growing broad shrub type. Eventually grows into a small tree from 2 to 4 m tall, with a broad, fan-shaped crown. The crown is about as wide as it is tall. Twigs are light brown and smooth, mature bark is grey-brown and deeply grooved when older. The fan-shaped leaves of the first sprouting curl into a typical tube shape making them look like small cups. This curvature makes the matt green underside of the leaf visible. The leaves of the second sprouting, later in the summer are often dissected. The leaves are distinctly smaller than the species, growing to about half as long. In autumn the leaf turns yellow before falling. This small tree is unmistakeable due to the striking leaf shape and is suitable for (small) gardens.
