



Acer rubrum INDIAN SUMMER ('Morgan')



Height	15 - 20 m
Crown	oval to broad oval, dark, dense crown
Bark and branches	twigs reddish brown, bark grey
Leaf	palmate, lobed, bright green, leaf stem red, about 10 cm, autumn colour orange-red
Autumn colour	orange, red
Flowers	red, in small umbels, onl male, March/April
Fruits	none: male cultivar, fruitless cultivar
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	moist, not calcareous
Paving	tolerates partial paving
Winter hardiness zone	4 (-34,4 to -28,9 °C)
Wind resistance	poor to moderate
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
Application	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, large gardens

Synonyms	Acer rubrum 'Indian Summer'

Dense, oval to wide oval crown. Vigorously growing, reaching a height of circa 20 m. Young twigs are red brown. The leaf stalk is red-brown too. The leaf is bright green and can be 10 cm. The underside of the leaf is blue-green. In comparison to other cultivars, it has a spectacular autumn colouring in orange-red hues. Juvenile trees already have this colouring. This autumn colour remains well into autumn. A male variety without any flowers or fruits. Limy soil stunts the growth. In dry soils no autumn colouring. Poor tolerance to (sea) wind. Winter hardiness zone: 4
