



## Fraxinus excelsior 'Geessink'



<b>Height</b>	15-20 m
<b>Crown</b>	broad ovoid, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green, feathered leaf
<b>Flowers</b>	yellowgreen, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	little
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, calcareous soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for wet soil, withstand short flood
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates partial paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	4 (-34,4 to -28,9 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, coastal areas, industrial areas, large gardens, windbreaks
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem tree

Fraxinus excelsior 'Geessink' is a fairly tall tree with a good, slightly bending, upright going trunk. Height 15 - 20 m. At first the crown is narrow pyramidal, later wide ovoid to almost round. The compound, odd-pinnate leaf has 9 - 11 leaflets, is mat dark green and light green underneath. In autumn the leaf turns yellow. After the inflorescence it bears only a few fruits. Applicable in road and street planting. 'Geessink' prefers nutritive, moist soil. Winter hardiness zone: 4
