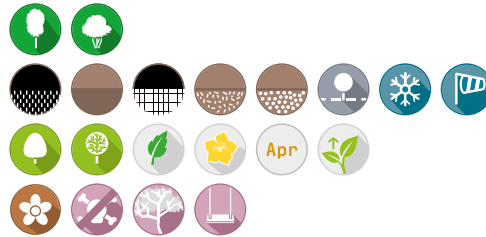


Magnolia ×brooklynensis 'Yellow Bird'

| Height | 5-10 m |
| Crown | broad ovoid, dark, dense crown, capricious growing |
| Bark and branches | brown, grey |

| Flowers | bright yellow, flowers in April |

| Toxicity | usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock |
| Soil type | clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, acid soil |
| Paving | tolerates partial paving |
| Winter hardiness zone | 6 (-23,3 to -17,8 °C) |
| Wind resistance | good |
| Other resistances | resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind |
| Application | avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, large gardens, small gardens |
| Shape | clearstem tree, multi-stem treem |

Medium-size tree with a regular pyramidal to broad ovoid crown of 5 - 10 m. The first flowers open around mid-May and the blossoms persist for about 3 weeks. The flowers are 7.5 - 10 cm in size and bright yellow. They stand out well against the light green leaves. The petals are fairly broad, giving them a tulip-like appearance. Originated in 1967 in the Brooklyn Botanic Garden, New York, USA, by backcrossing M. x brooklynensis 'Evamaria' with M. acuminata, but was not named until 1981. Good, tree-size, yellow blossoming Magnolia.
