

Malus 'Liset'



Height	5 - 6 (7) m
Crown	round, fairly open, half-open crown
Bark and branches	hairless, dark brown
Leaf	oval to ovoid, purple to dark bronze-green, 6 - 8 cm
Flowers	purplish-pink, single, Ø 3 - 4 cm
Fruits	round, purplish-brown, Ø 1.2 - 1.6 cm
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	nutritious, well drained soil
Paving	tolerates paving
Winter hardiness zone	4 (-34,4 to -28,9 °C)
Wind resistance	good, susceptible to sea wind
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
Fauna tree	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
Application	parks, squares, cemeteries, roof gardens, industrial areas, large gardens, small gardens, patio gardens
Shape	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem

The 'Liset' is a large shrub to a small tree of Dutch origin. The tree starts out with a fairly dense crown that later becomes looser and rounded. Height 5 - 6 (7) m. The leaves are purplish and retain this colour for a long time in the summer. Eventually they turn dark bronze-green. The flowers are purplish-pink and hardly turn lighter. They measure approx. 3.5 cm and are single. The flower buds are dark purplish-brown. Fairly small, round, purplish-brown fruits emerge in the autumn. They stay on the tree until late October. Can be used in parks, public gardens and small gardens. It makes heavy demands on the soil as regards moisture supply and fertility. 'Liset' is sensitive to scab and to sea wind. Young shoots can be affected by mildew. In the winter the tree develops growth splits on trunk and twigs and is definitely not a good ornamental apple tree.
