




## Prunus incisa 'February Pink'



<b>Height</b>	3-5 m
<b>Crown</b>	broad conical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Autumn colour</b>	orange, red
<b>Flowers</b>	light pink, flowers in January
<b>Fruits</b>	purple/brown, black, little
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, all soil types
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardness zone</b>	6b (-20,5 to -17,8 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	moderate
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), valuable for bees (honey plant)
<b>Application</b>	parks, cemeteries, large gardens, small gardens, patio gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem tree

Broad upright large shrub to small tree from 3 to 5 m. Initially grows quite vertically, but goes on to develop a broad pyramidal crown. The leaves are strikingly pointed and have a doubly serrated margin. In autumn the green leaf turns orange-red. 'February Pink' blossoms very early. In non-freezing conditions the very light pink flowers already open in January. The early blossoming time means the flowers and flower buds can freeze more easily. Bears few fruits which are purplish black and round. Loves fertile, moist soil and does not tolerate drought well.
