



## Prunus padus 'Albertii'



<b>Height</b>	8-10 m
<b>Crown</b>	broad conical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	white, flowers in April, fragrant flowers
<b>Fruits</b>	black
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, calcareous soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	3 (-40,0 to -24,5 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	moderate
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), provides food for birds
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, large gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree

Prunus padus 'Albertii' has a pyramidal to broadly conical and well-closed crown. Height 8 - 10 m. The dull brown to brownish-grey branches smell of bitter almonds when damaged. The dark green oval to ovoid leaves have an irregularly serrated edge. Produces many flowers in April and May after the leaves have emerged. White flowers in narrow pendulous bunches up to 18 cm long. Fragrant. Forms black fruits with a diameter of 7 - 9 mm. For small gardens, streets, parks and public gardens. Withstands wet soil. Winter hardiness zone: 3
