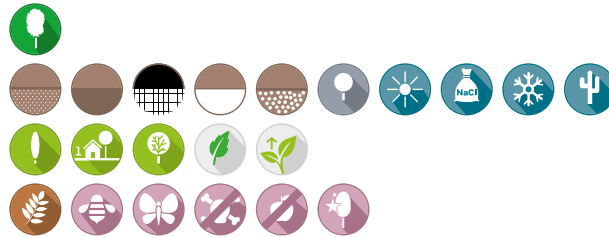




# Robinia pseudoacacia

## 'Pyramidalis'



<b>Height</b>	13-15 m
<b>Crown</b>	columnar, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green, feathered leaf
<b>Flowers</b>	seldom
<b>Fruits</b>	fruitless cultivar
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, nutrient-poor soil, calcareous soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for dry soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	fairly
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt, valuable for butterflies
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, industrial areas, large gardens, windbreaks
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree
<b>Synonyms</b>	Robinia var. fastigiata

Robinia pseudoacacia 'Pyramidalis' (syn. R. pseudoacacia fastigiata) has a narrow, column-shaped, semi-transparent crown. The branches hang down somewhat when the tree ages. Height approx. 13 - 15 m, width up to approx. 3 - 5 m. The light brown twigs have fewer thorns than those of the species and sometimes are even thornless. Leaves emerge late in the spring and remain on the tree a long time. 'Pyramidalis' rarely blooms and is less sensitive to wind than the other cultivars are. Well-suited for small gardens and narrow streets. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
