




Robinia pseudoacacia 'Pyramidalis'



Height	13-15 m
Crown	columnar, half-open crown
Bark and branches	brown, grey
Leaf	green, feathered leaf
Flowers	seldom
Fruits	fruitless cultivar
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, nutrient-poor soil, calcareous soil
Soil moisture	suitable for dry soil
Paving	tolerates no paving
Winter hardiness zone	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
Wind resistance	fairly
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt
Fauna tree	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt, valuable for butterflies
Application	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, industrial areas, large gardens, windbreaks
Shape	clearstem tree
Synonyms	Robinia var. <i>fastigiata</i>

Robinia pseudoacacia 'Pyramidalis' (syn. *R. pseudoacacia fastigiata*) has a narrow, column-shaped, semi-transparent crown. The branches hang down somewhat when the tree ages. Height approx. 13 - 15 m, width up to approx. 3 - 5 m. The light brown twigs have fewer thorns than those of the species and sometimes are even thornless. Leaves emerge late in the spring and remain on the tree a long time. 'Pyramidalis' rarely blooms and is less sensitive to wind than the other cultivars are. Well-suited for small gardens and narrow streets. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
