



Robinia ambigua 'Decaisneana'



Height	18-20 m
Crown	oval, half-open crown
Bark and branches	brown, grey
Leaf	green, feathered leaf
Autumn colour	yellow
Flowers	cream white, flowers in June, fragrant flowers
Fruits	reddisch brown
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, nutrient-poor soil, calcareous soil
Soil moisture	suitable for dry soil
Paving	tolerates paving
Winter hardiness zone	3 (-40,0 to -24,5 °C)
Wind resistance	fairly to good
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
Fauna tree	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), valuable for bees (honey plant)
Application	parks, cemeteries, coastal areas, industrial areas, large gardens

An old, vigorously growing cultivar with a loose crown. At first it is narrow and oval, later becoming somewhat broader. Height 18 - 20 (25) m. The crown has a more regular shape than that of the species and the twigs have few to no thorns. The leaves and flowers are similar to those of the species. 'Semperflorens' blooms much more profusely, however. A less profuse flowering follows every year in August and September. Consequently, it has become popular for use as a park and avenue tree. Its open crown makes the tree reasonably to highly wind-resistant. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
