



Sorbus aucuparia 'Xanthocarpa'



Height	6-10 m
Crown	round/spherical, half-open crown
Bark and branches	grey
Leaf	green, feathered leaf
Autumn colour	yellow, orange, red
Flowers	white, flowers in May
Fruits	yellow, orange
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, acid soil
Soil moisture	suitable for dry soil
Paving	tolerates no paving
Winter hardiness zone	4 (-34,4 to -28,9 °C)
Wind resistance	good
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
Fauna tree	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
Application	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, tree containers, cemeteries, roof gardens, large gardens, small gardens

Because it lacks a top branch, 'Xanthocarpa' has a broad loose crown that eventually becomes spherical. The tree attains a height of 6 - 10 m and has a smooth light grey trunk. Young twigs are brown and bear many lenticels. The leaves are identical to those of the species and turn yellow to orange-red in the autumn. The orange-yellow fruit is characteristic of this cultivar. The fruit emerges from late July and is not much eaten by birds. Grows best on sandy soil that is not too moist and in a sunny site. Here the tree remains at its healthiest. Winter hardiness zone:
